

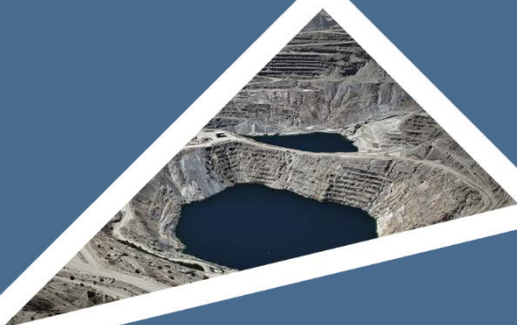


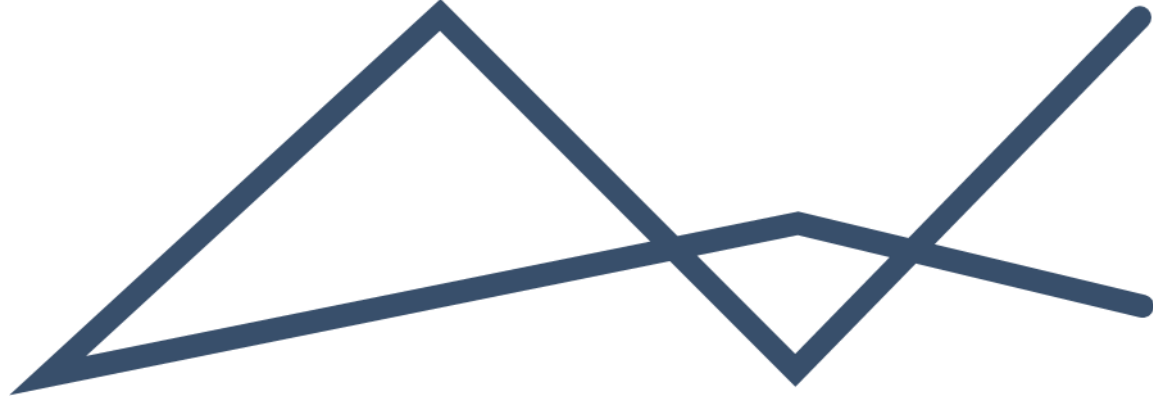
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PUBLIC PARTICIPATION REPORT

HARMONY MPONENG LOWER COMPARTMENT TAILINGS STORAGE
FACILITY





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1 INTRODUCTION

Harmony Gold Mining Company Limited (hereafter referred to as the applicant) has appointed Environmental Impact Management Services (Pty) Ltd (EIMS) as the Environmental Assessment Practitioner (EAP) to undertake the necessary environmental authorisation and associated consultation processes. EIMS will compile and submit the required documentation in support of applications for:

- Environmental Authorisation (EA) in accordance with the NEMA- Listed activity/ies:
 - GNR983 Listing Notice 1, Activities 10, 12, 19, 21D, and 21F.
 - GNR984 Listing Notice 2, Activity 6 and 15.
 - GNR985 Listing Notice 3, Activities 12, 14, and 23.
- Waste Management Licence in accordance with the requirements of the National Environmental Management: Waste Act- NEM:WA (Act 59 of 2008) - Listed activity/ies:
 - GNR921 Categories B7, B10 and B11.
- Water Use Licence (WUL) in accordance with the National Water Act – NWA (Act 36 of 1998) - Listed activity/ies:
 - Section 21 (a), (c), (g) and (i).

Additional activities to be applied for may be raised and will be confirmed during the process.

The applicant owns and operates a number of Gold Mines and Plants in the West Wits region in the Gauteng Province. The Savuka Plant currently deposits tailings onto the Savuka 5a, 5b, 7a & 7b Tailings Storage Facilities (TSFs). However, these facilities are approaching their final and approved height, and the current planned Life of Mine (LOM) for the West Wits region exceeds the available deposition capacity of these TSFs. Accordingly, the applicant is undertaking a feasibility assessment to recommence deposition on the Mponeng Lower Compartment TSF. The applicant is proposing to recommence deposition on the Mponeng Tailings Storage Facility Lower Compartment (hereafter referred to as Mponeng Lower Compartment TSF). The Mponeng Lower Compartment TSF is located at 26°27'11.18"S; 27°24'43.88"E. Mponeng Lower Compartment TSF is an existing TSF, however, the TSF is no longer in operation and is currently utilised as a Holding Dam, and a portion (approximately 200m²) of the 110ha TSF footprint is used as an authorised Landfill Facility.

In order to redeposit on the Mponeng Lower Compartment TSF, from the Savuka Plant, slurry pipelines will need to be constructed from the Savuka Plant to the TSF. The proposed slurry and return water pipes extend from the south of Savuka Plant at starting point 26°25'24.95"S; 27°23'58.94"E, extending southwards, parallel to each other until reaching the northern extent of Mponeng Lower Compartment TSF where they split. Thereafter, the slurry pipeline extends to west before connecting to Mponeng TSF while the return water pipeline extends east then south around the TSF to the return water dam. There is an alternative slurry and return water pipeline route which extends to the east through Western Deep Levels then south along Mponeng Gold Mine before heading to the west where it connects to Mponeng Lower Compartment TSF.

2 OBJECTIVES OF THE PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

South Africa, being one of the countries with the most progressive constitutions, enshrined the public's right to be involved in decisions that may affect them in its Constitution. Section 57(1) of the new Constitution that provides: *"The National Assembly may (b) make rules and orders concerning its business, with due regard to representative and participatory democracy, accountability, transparency and public involvement"*. This provision, along with several others gave rise to many new trends in South African legislation. In environmental legislation, the idea of public participation (or stakeholder engagement) features strongly and especially the National Environmental Management Act (Act 107 of 1998, NEMA) and the recent regulations passed under the auspices of this Act makes very strict provisions for public participation in environmental decision-making.



Public participation can be defined as...*"a process leading to a joint effort by stakeholders, technical specialists, the authorities and the proponent who work together to produce better decisions than if they had acted independently"*¹. From this definition, it can be seen that the input of the public is regarded as very important indeed.

The Public Participation Process (PPP) is designed to provide sufficient and accessible information to Interested and Affected Parties (I&APs) in an objective manner to assist them to:

During the Environmental Authorisation:

- Verify that their issues have been recorded;
- Comment on the findings of the environmental assessments; and
- Provide relevant local information and knowledge to the environmental assessment.

The PPP is a requirement of several pieces of South African Legislation and aims to ensure that all relevant I&APs are consulted, involved and their opinions are taken into account and a record included in the reports submitted to Authorities. The process ensures that all stakeholders are provided this opportunity as part of a transparent process which allows for a robust and comprehensive environmental study. The PPP for the necessary authorisation required for the project needs to be managed sensitively and according to best practises in order to ensure and promote:

- Compliance with international best practice options;
- Compliance with national legislation;
- Establishment and management of relationships with key stakeholder groups; and
- Encouragement of involvement and participation in the environmental study and authorisation/approval process.

As such, the purpose of the PPP and stakeholder engagement process is to:

- Introduce the proposed project and process for the authorisation project;
- Explain the environmental authorisation;
- Determine and record issues, concerns, suggestions, and objections to the project;
- Provide opportunity for input and gathering of local knowledge;
- Establish and formalise lines of communication between the I&APs and the project team;
- Identify all significant issues for the project; and
- Identify possible mitigation measures or environmental management plans to minimise and/or prevent negative environmental impacts and maximise and/or promote positive environmental impacts associated with the project.

This Public Participation Report (PPR) lists all verbal and written issues raised by I&APs during the call to register period from the 15th of August 2025 to the date of finalization of this report. A breakdown of the PPP is given within the remaining sections of this PPR.

3 LEGAL COMPLIANCE

The PPP must comply with all environmental legislation that requires public participation as part of an application for authorisation or approval; namely, the National Environmental Management Act (NEMA, Act No. 107 of 1998).



Adherence to the requirements of the above-mentioned Act will allow for an Integrated PPP to be conducted, and in so doing, satisfy the requirements for public participation referenced in the Act. The details of the Integrated PPP are provided below.

4 IDENTIFICATION OF INTERESTED AND AFFECTED PARTIES (I&APS)

An initial I&AP database has been compiled from historic projects in the area, and Windeed searches were conducted to obtain the contact details of the surrounding landowners. The I&APs referred to in the PPR include:

- Pre-identified and registered landowners and surrounding landowners;
- Pre-identified and registered key stakeholders;
- Regulatory authorities;
- Specialist interest groups; and
- All I&APs who responded to the initial notifications and requested to be registered.

Efforts to pre-identify key I&APs involved various avenues such as consultation with the proponent and known landowners within the study area, review of related previously conducted studies, and identification of key interest groups and authorities within the vicinity of the study area and municipality. 5 NOTIFICATION OF INTERESTED AND AFFECTED PARTIES

The PPP commenced on the 15th of August 2025 with an initial call to register notification. Notification during this initial consultation was given in the manner described below.

- Newspaper advertisement in the Carletonville Herald

Contact details were provided to I&APs should they require assistance accessing the information or require copies of the reports.

A hard copy of the Scoping Report was placed at the Deelkraal Library (Deelkraal Drive: 26° 27' 32.534" S, 27° 19' 28.271" E) and at the Carletonville Public Library (c/o Beryl & Emerald St.: 26° 21' 19.839" S, 27° 24' 4.129" E) for a period of thirty (30).
